We recognise the significant racial disparities within cancer support and are committed to addressing these challenges. The Croydon BME Forum is dedicated to supporting our community, increasing awareness, and providing essential information to our harder-to-reach populations. Through this effort, we aim to build long-lasting, sustainable relationships that will make a meaningful difference.

I want to extend a heartfelt thank you to Macmillan for believing in and trusting us to deliver this crucial three-year project. Your support is invaluable. Additionally, I want to express our gratitude to our Royal Marsden Partners, who first approached us three years ago to collaborate on their Cancer Awareness programme. Your foresight and partnership have been instrumental in laying the groundwork for our ongoing efforts.

We will continue to tackle health inequalities in our work and strive to be a catalyst for change. Together, we can make a significant impact and ensure that everyone, regardless of their background, has access to the cancer support they deserve.

ABOUT THE CONFERENCE

This conference aims to address racial disparities within cancer support, an area that requires more attention according to documented evidence. The Croydon BME Forum has partnered with Macmillan Cancer Support on a three-year project spanning six southwest London boroughs: Croydon, Merton, Sutton, Wandsworth, Richmond, and Kingston. This initiative tackles health inequalities and amplifies the voices of marginalised communities from Black and minority ethnic backgrounds.

According to the British Journal of Cancer, Black people are more than a third less likely than White people to be diagnosed with cancer via screening in England. This research highlights stark disparities, showing that Black people are 38% less likely to be diagnosed via screening compared to White people. Cancer rates vary by race and ethnicity, revealing significant discrepancies between different groups. It is imperative for minority ethnic communities to understand these differences and inequalities in cancer. Addressing these disparities will not only improve regular screening and early diagnosis but also highlight the need to fill gaps in policy and practice. While there have been significant strides in cancer diagnosis and treatment, these achievements are not equally distributed. At the Croydon BME Forum, we will continue to raise awareness of long-term health conditions, provide appropriate community-led interventions, and champion the voices of those with lived experiences.

She was involved with NHS England 'Be Clear on Cancer' targeting the Black and Ethnic minority groups like using churches social media and radio interviews. She previously worked with the Macmillan Breast CNS patients for 15 years.

On 5th July 2023 She was awarded the lifetime achievement for 40 years of Nursing and pastoral care support for International Nurses at the NHS Parliamentary Awards and went to a reception at 10 Downing Street the same day.

Organisation: St George's Hospital

Lisa-Lyna Ofosu-Asare is a Health Improvement Specialist for Bowel Cancer, based at St Georges Hospital. Lisa-Lyna has a passion for all things cancer related, and has been working in cancer for the last 9 years. She is an advocate for healthy lifestyle choices and works (both in the community and alongside Health Professionals) on raising awareness about Bowel Cancer, their signs and symptoms and eligible people that can take part in the screening programme.



Petrina Kamara

Petrina Kamara was diagnosed with breast cancer in August 2020 right in the middle of the pandemic. However, the diagnosis did not deter her pursuit to continue their studies while going through cancer treatments, to qualify as a Chartered Surveyor. She has used her experience with cancer to support others either directly and via Macmillan, The Health Show and Prostrate Cancer UK. She has recently started Africa Cancer Support (ACS), an organisation that is committed to demystifying the taboo around cancer in the African Community by raising awareness to minimise the risks of premature death.



Lorna Jones

Job title: Trichologist

Organisation: Caring for Hair Trichology Clinic

Lorna Jones qualified as a Trichologist from the prestigious International Association of Trichologists. She undertook her clinical training in various parts of the world including Australia, South Africa, Washington and the UK.

She set up her clinic dealing with hair loss and scalp issues, Caring for Hair, in London where she is now based.

She is a published author and speaks at conferences both in the UK and internationally on various aspects of hair care and hair loss; she runs training courses and trains new trichologists.

She is also the National Group leader of the UK CCCA support group run by the Scarring Alopecia Foundation (SAF), based in the US. CCCA, otherwise known as Central Centrifugal Cicatricial Alopecia is a type of central hair loss condition that is found almost exclusively in black women. Recognising some of the unique experiences that individuals with Afro-textured hair may face regarding cancer-related hair loss, she founded C & Hair. It is a service dedicated to providing support and guidance for individuals with Afro-textured hair faced with hair loss due to cancer



Baljit Vohra

Baljit is currently the Lead Cancer Nurse for Croydon Health

Services and has worked with Cancer patients for 22 years. Her

qualifications are as follows: BSc (Critical care Nursing), Dip

Orin Lewis OBE is the co-founder (alongside his partner Beverley De-Gale, OBE) and CEO of leading UK blood cancer charity, the ACLT (African Caribbean Leukaemia Trust).

ACLT was founded in June 1996, after Orin and his partner Beverley received the devastating news that their 6-year-old son Daniel De-Gale needed a lifesaving stem cell transplant in order to win his 3-year battle against leukaemia.



Nicola Delsol

Since my diagnosis in September 2023, it's inspired me to do more public & inspirational speaking. Having had such an extraordinary journey over the last 10 months, I feel compelled to share my journey of change & to push the message of not to wait for a diagnosis to make changes. I want to raise more awareness of breast cancer in younger people and that it doesn't mean it's a death sentence but rather a time to inspire.

Paulette is a highly experienced and respected leader and management consultant specialising in health, management, leadership, and institutional strengthening.
