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### **About the Can You C Me? Project**

The Can You C Me? project is a Macmillan-funded initiative led by Croydon BME Forum, working across six London boroughs to improve cancer care awareness, access, and experiences for Black and Minority Ethnic (BME) communities. Through a combination of outreach, support, lived experience engagement, and professional collaboration, we are working to reduce inequalities and break down barriers in cancer care.

# THE KINGSTON CANCER CONFERENCE 29 MAY 2025

This was the third in a series of six conferences planned and delivered by the Can You C Me? team, co-designed with Places Leisure, and aimed at tackling racial disparities in cancer care. By bringing together healthcare professionals, community leaders and policymakers, the event promoted more inclusive and equitable approaches. Held in partnership with Macmillan Cancer Support, it focused on amplifying marginalised voices and advancing culturally responsive care across South West London.

The day featured a range of powerful speakers, including a keynote from Kingston Mayor Noel Hadjimichael. Marie O'Loughlin shared an innovative model linking leisure centres with cancer pathways, while experts Archana Sood and Helen Ricketts offered practical insights from frontline services. Orin Lewis OBE gave a strong call for systemic change, and lived experience speakers Sophie Brown and Anslim Pope offered moving reflections on their personal cancer journeys.

The event also included a varied programme of workshops covering clinical trials, faith and identity in cancer care, and culturally sensitive palliative support. Creative sessions such as pottery, art therapy and line dancing provided a refreshing end to the day, giving attendees the chance to unwind, connect and reflect in a welcoming and uplifting environment.








# **BOROUGH REPRESENATION AT THE EVENT**




# ARE YOU ATTENDING THIS EVENT AS A:




# WHAT IS YOUR ETHNICITY?

(Your response helps us understand if we are reaching all communities effectively)





# HAVE YOU BEEN AFFECTED BY CANCER YOURSELF?




# **OVERALL EXPERIENCE**

How would you rate the quality of the speakers and their presentations?








## WHY?


- Marie Great to see what we are doing locally in New Malden
